"The watchmen found me as they made their rounds in the city.


They beat me, they bruised me; they took away my cloak, those watchmen of the walls!" Song 5:7

Heb: 'Dodim' occurs 32 times throughout the Song. Refers to lovemaking, is diluted when translated 'love'


"Come, let's drink deeply of <u>love</u> till morning; let's enjoy ourselves with <u>love!</u> My husband is not at home..."

She Seals Him

Owner places the seal on the 'owned'

God owns His disciples

=> She owns him!

Mountains Symbolize a Ruling Power





Mountains of Bether, in Israel (2:17) King calls Bride away from Lebanon (2:10-13; 4:8) Doves in the Bride's eyes (4:1; 1:15) King sees her from head downwards, as if above (4:1-7) Tower of David, King of Israel (4:4) The Centerpiece: Sexual union of King & Bride (5:1) Tower of Lebanon; her breasts (7:4; 8:10) King sees her from feet upwards, as if beneath (7:1-9) Doves in the King's eyes (5:12) Bride calls King away from Jerusalem (8:14) Mountains of spices – pleasures (8:14)

"Sixty queens there may be..." 6:8






Spiritually, the "terrors of the night" were never outside Solomon's own bed

The King Who Fell

King Solomon, however, loved many foreign women besides Pharaoh's daughter—Moabites, Ammonites, Edomites, Sidonians and Hittites. They were from nations about which the LORD had told the Israelites, "You must not intermarry with them, because they will surely turn your hearts after their gods." Nevertheless, Solomon held fast to them in love. He had seven hundred wives of royal birth and three hundred concubines, and his wives led him astray. As Solomon grew old, his wives turned his heart after other gods, and his heart was not fully devoted to the LORD his God, as the heart of David his father had been. He followed Ashtoreth the goddess of the Sidonians, and Molech the detestable god of the Ammonites. So Solomon did evil in the eyes of the LORD; he did not follow the LORD completely, as David his father had done. 1 Kgs 11:1-6

Solomon's favourite Bride was Sidonian (Lebanese)
